HWOA AGM Recap:

We met on February 17, 2024 at the Guthrie Arena to celebrate our 2023 achievements and plan for events in 2024. (34 members were in attendance.)

Updated info was presented about the Simcoe County Museum saw mill restoration. A recap was given of our 2023 Forest Health Day (Biodiversity); the Fall Field Day event (hosted by Sandy Agnew); and the presentation of the White Pine Award (recipient Sandy Agnew).

John Crawford requested help in scanning 100s of 35mm slides documenting past HWOA events.

Treasurer's report was accepted. Election of directors was conducted.



Jack O'Hara Forestry Scholarship

The HWOA awards the Jack O'Hara Forestry Scholarship annually; this **\$1,000** scholarship is awarded to a College or University student who has completed one year or two semesters in a Forestry Program or a program that impacts on Forestry. Applicants were screened by Cameron Douglas and Mark Scharf.

In February 2024 this award was presented to JENNIFER CANN for her forestry studies at the University of Toronto. As Jenn was in Chile at the time, she sent a video describing her research and passion for the outdoors.



New Directors!

Four new HWOA Board Directors were elected to serve a 3-yr term:

Adam Parker: Grew up just outside the village of Minesing with parents Harold and Linda Parker and siblings Rachel and Robert. Our home was on 50 acres with some farmland and a hardwood forest with a maple syrup house. From my early teens I would spend much of my spare time exploring the woods, helping process firewood to heat our home / boil maple syrup, annual tree planting and the countless odd jobs that come with living in the country. With my parents now both passed on, this property has recently been sold.

Down the road, my parents also had 175 acres bordering the Willow Creek and backing onto the Minesing Wetlands. I am now fortunate be a co-owner of this property which we hope to keep in the family for years to come.



Through forestry consultant connections made through the HWOA there have been various selective timber and firewood harvests from our woodlots over the years. Small plantations of conifer trees that we planted border the 20 acres of active farmland. Over the last 10 years through the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority and community volunteer groups, thousands of native trees and shrubs including silver maple, hackberry and burr oak have also been planted on portions of our property. The variety of habitats on our property and surrounding area make it a haven for birds and wildlife.

In my youth I enjoyed attending the HWOA meetings and field days with my father. After graduation from university, I joined the board and acted as secretary from about 1997 – 2002.

With only a short drive from our home in the City of Barrie our family frequently enjoys spending time at our property in Minesing. In 2024, on the downward slope of my formal working career, our children mostly grown, and with the support of my wife Carolyn, it is with pleasure I find myself back on the HWOA Board.



Grant Casbourne: My wife Bonnie and I bought a 50 acre woodlot on Line 5 N near the Bass Lake Road 25 years ago. What we loved about the woodlot was how lush and beautiful it was. It is a mix of maple, black cherry, white pine, red oak and beech.

Our plan was to build there in 5 years, but life got in the way. We have since raised our 2 children, Taylor and Kiera, in New Lowell, about a 40 min drive from the woodlot and we are hoping to move to the woodlot in the next 2-3 years.

Through the Woodland Management program, I have learned a little bit of woodland care but I want to continue to learn more and become a better woodland steward to keep our woodlot lush and vibrant.


Curtis Gray: I have been living in Oro-Medonte for my entire life. I consider myself very fortunate to have had the opportunity to live in a rural community and own property in the community that I grew up in.

In 2003 my wife and I bought 33 acres in Craighurst where our passion for agriculture and tree planting began. Every spring we would plant dozens of native seedlings in areas that were not arable with the hope of watching them mature.

But, in 2014 we bought the family farm! Twisted Maple Farm is 140 acres near Horseshoe Valley. The farm consists of 25 acres of red pine, 25 acres of mixed hardwood (primarily sugar maples) and 90 acres of pasture and hay fields.

Together with our son we continue planting new trees every spring and spend all summer watering them. Varieties include Chestnut,

White and Black spruce, Red and White oak, Shagbark hickory, Red and White Pine, Hemlock, Sugar maple, Ash and Hybrid Poplar.





Sandy Agnew: Originally from Vaughan, Sandy moved up to Penetanguishene in 1974. He later purchased his current 47-acre property in Oro-Medonte in 1997 which consists of mostly low wetland at the headwaters of Hogg Creek and includes 13 acres of Provincially Significant Wetland.

In 2004 he established a conservation easement on 39 acres with the Couchiching Conservancy Land Trust. With his partner Lynne Melnyk, they are in the process of donating this easement to the Couchiching Conservancy for protection in perpetuity.

Trained in ecological restoration at Niagara College, Sandy is a managed forest plan approver under the MFTIP program, and since 2004 has completed over 200 managed forest plans.

Sandy has been a member of HWOA for over 20 years; and for the last couple of years has been involved with the OWA-Huronia Community Forest Co-op committee working to thin small conifer plantations. Last November he was honoured to receive the Huronia Chapter's White Pine Award.

Craig Drury has invited us to visit his farm and forestry operation on Saturday September 21, 2024.


