
Recap: FOREST HEALTH MEETING hosted by HWOA

Theme:

What does a healthy, well managed forest look like?

Held at the Edgar Community Hall on June 6, 2023 – 7 to 9 pm

HWOA Director **Jack McFadden** chaired the meeting. The room was full, and three staff members from OWA attended.



1. Bio-diversity and why it's important: **David Hawke** gave examples of what poor biodiversity looks like in a forest and also examples of good biodiversity. The greater the mix (biodiversity) of plant and animal species, the healthier your forest will be.



2. County of Simcoe Perspective: **Brett Dixon** from Simcoe County Forests showed photos of what they consider to be examples of unhealthy woodlots and some photos of good healthy woodlots. Brett challenged participants with many quiz questions (and fun rewards).



3a. MFTIP planning and what tree markers consider when marking a managed forest with **Peter Devilliers** (photo to left) and **Earl Dertinger** (photo below).



3b. **Earl Dertinger** shared his extensive knowledge about managing a forest for healthy biodiversity with his trademark humour and insights.

IN OTHER NEWS:

Oak Wilt: Unfortunately, this fatal fungus has shown up in Simcoe County. Not widespread at the moment but the future looks bleak. Spread by beetles that are attracted to wounds in hardwoods, the fungus spores are carried tree to tree by the beetles. Once a tree is infected, the fungus then travels through the roots and soil to neighbouring oak trees.

While there does not appear to be way to stop this invasive fungus from hitting your favorite oak tree, you can slow down the spread by NOT pruning of thinning oak trees in the growing season (the sweet smelling sap attracts the beetles). Wait until frosty weather to do your hardwoods pruning or thinning.
